Pentecost 2006

And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. (Acts 2:2-3)

I am a small child, gazing at a large painting. My father, standing next to me in the museum, has just told me that the robed men depicted in the painting are Jesus' disciples. Then he says something about tongues of flame. The men pictured are leaning in towards one another, their hands pressed together prayerfully, their eyes uplifted. I look at their mouths which are all closed and, disappointed, don't see any tongues at all, much less tongues that are on fire.

Then I notice that on top of every head there is a flame. Recent experiments with matches have made me painfully aware that fire is dangerous, so I wonder why they aren't beating at each other's heads, trying to put each other out before their hair starts burning. Maybe they don't know they are on fire. But, they know something is happening. Every one of them is gazing upward as if trying to see the top of his head.

Absently rubbing the top of *my* head, I consider the possibility that these obviously holy men have wicks, like candles. Perhaps this is something one develops when one gets older and holier. But, I can't think of a single person I've met whose head was on fire. Surely I would have noticed. It seems to me that having a flame on top of one's head is quite amazing and I wonder why the men in the painting don't seem more excited.

Fifty years later, I'm still wondering. I suspect, there is in each of us a desire to maintain a certain distance when it comes to the unpredictable nature of God, as represented by the Holy Spirit. During Jonathan's sabbatical time, I've been visiting other churches on Sunday mornings. Experiencing different ways of worshiping, encountering other takes on theology – it's all been stimulating and meaningful. Everywhere I've gone I've encountered good will and a warm welcome. But, no where, no where, have I encountered passion.

Like the painter who chose to portray the disciples as pious men wearing well-contained flames, most of us prefer our encounters with the Spirit to be in a form both manageable and unchallenging. We tend to maintain a certain distance in corporate worship and individual practice, withholding something of ourselves, observing rather than participating with fully surrendered hearts. This is not something that's true only for staid liturgical Episcopalians. I sensed this same reserve today in a mega-church service, where the hand-clapping and amplified praise choruses only underscored the observer status of most of the congregation.

It's safer that way. The Spirit is an agent of change, powerful change. It is like a violent wind. Its presence feels like the room is full of flames. What would this intensity do to us if we were to let it in, fully, without reservation? I don't know, because I haven't let that happen in my own life.

But I do know that nothing will change for the better – not the degradation of our planet, not the horrors that we humans visit upon one another – if we do not allow ourselves to be changed. God's redemption of creation can only come about through us. I challenge each of us to raise the windows of our minds to admit that Spirit wind and open our inner rooms to the influx of that Spirit fire. May wind and flame become a conflagration and may we become

passionate participants in the work of the Spirit in the world. Heads on fire. Surely, someone will notice.

Pentecost Sunday - June 4

The story of Pentecost is told in Acts 2:

"When the day of Pentecost had come, [the disciples] were all together in one place. And suddenly a sound came from heaven like the rush of a mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting. And there appeared to them tongues as of fire, distributed and resting on each one of them. And they were

all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance."

In ***Encountering God*** Diane Eck describes the dramatic and creative ways Pentecost was celebrated in the Middle Ages. Some churches had "Holy Spirit holes" in the ceiling to symbolize their openness to God. On Pentecost, doves were released through the holes and bundles of rose petals were dropped from them onto the people gathered inside. Choirboys moved through the congregation making whooshing sounds and playing drums to remind everyone of the rush of the Spirit. What a ritual that must have been!

The red linens traditionally used in the sanctuary at this time symbolize both the fire of Pentecost as well as the apostles and early followers of Jesus who were gathered in the Upper Room for the empowerment from God to proclaim the Gospel throughout the world.

On Sunday June 4 come celebrate the Birthday of the Christian Church and wear red to remember the Fire of the Holy Spirit AND stay after the worship service for a Pitch-in Dinner. Contact Carol Ruffin at 988-6053 for information.

Acts 2:17: "I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams."

Saddle Up for St. Jude ride successful

For the past 15 years I have participated as a coordinator or assistant in an annual horse trail ride to benefit St. Jude Children's Hospital. Prior to 2000, I did this with Dr. John and Chris Thomas. When Dr. John Thomas passed away from pancreatic cancer in 2000, I started doing the coordination of these rides with Andy Bond, from Nashville.

We ride at Brown County State Park, and have riders participate from as far away as Rochester and Michigan. This year, we had rainy weather, but 23 brave souls saddled up and rode the trails. One year we had an infestation of "looper" caterpillars, that dropped on us all the ride. Several years were wet, several really gorgeous sunny days. One year we had 61 riders. We gather prizes to award at the end of the ride and St. Jude provides t-shirts, sweatshirts, totebags and caps according to the amount of money raised by the rider. We end the day with a free bar-b-que.

Every year we have managed to raise at least 3,000 dollars. It's great to have the participation of several 4-H clubs and many young people. Our youngest rider this year was a 6 year old boy and our oldest rider was a 67 year old man. Our shortest horse was an Icelandic pony at 12'1" hands and our tallest horse was 16'2". Our oldest horse was 22, our youngest horse was a 3 year old.

Shops in Nashville have continuously generously donated prizes as well and several other businesses like the Morgan County Feed and Kroger have always given really generously of prize materials and pastries respectively. Many people contribute their time and energy to see this ride take place, believing it to be a truly worthy cause.

St. Jude provides medical care to children who are victims of catastrophic illnesses. As a research hospital, they share their treatment and results worldwide. They have assisted greatly in

increasing the statistical chances of surviving acute lymphoblastic leukemia from 3% to today's 90%.

Thanks to everyone who helped support this trail ride, including our generous St. David's parishioners.

Pitch-ins & Potlucks--Famous Recipes

Judy Huber's Semi-famous Pennsylvania Dutch Mac and Cheese

Set your oven to 350 degrees. Get out your biggest casserole dish and spray it with cooking spray. Boil up 1 1/4 lbs. of pasta (I use spirals). While they are cooking, cut up the cheese into little squares--THREE packs of Cracker Barrel White Cheddar (GREEN package). IGA now has the "green" cheese.

Drain the pasta (undercook a little), put pasta into casserole dish and put cheese over it; mix gently. Immediately, pour 2% milk over it, just so you can see it rising a bit in the pasta (about a quart). Whole milk makes it even richer.

Pour seasoned bread crumbs on top (lots) and then Parmesan Cheese over that (lots). Place in oven for 50-60 minutes. I cook with convection; about 50 minutes is right.

Enjoy and tell all your friends you have converted into a "Deutscher."

Cream Pies Made Easy

Buy a double pack (2) of frozen deep dish pie shells. Thaw for 20 minutes at room temperature. Spray lightly with Pam and pierce shells several times with a fork. Bake at 350 degrees for 13-16 minutes (lightly brown).

- 2 - small packages of instant chocolate FUDGE pudding mix
- 2 - small packages of instant lemon pudding mix
- 1% or skim milk per package directions for pie filling
- 2 - light Cool Whip, thawed (The Cool Whip fat free is not recommended)

In two different bowls, thoroughly mix each flavor pudding mix till thickened. Pour into two different pre-baked pie shells. Cool in refrigerator for 2 hours - spread Cool Whip on each pie (thick is better!). Cool another 1/2 hour or till served.

This is a fairly low calorie dessert that everyone loves for summertime!
